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Content Warnings

This show contains content that some people may find difficult, including:

- Explorations of racism
- Depictions of microaggressions
- Depictions classism
- Explorations of the effects of the climate crisis including mentions of flooding, burnout, and eco-anxiety
- Voluntary audience reaction audience members will be asked (but not required to) carry out instructions given to them

Loud Bangs: Scene Breakdown

Approximately 35-40 minutes into the play, the performer Lekhani playing Amara will bang the pink ukulele on top of the big crate.

Approximately 45-50 minutes into the play, the performer Lekhani playing Amara will bang the small wooden crate onto the floor. She will also tip plastic bottles onto the stage repeatedly for approximately 1-2 minutes. The sound may be loud and alarming

Creative Captions

Captions are creatively embedded into BURNOUT, and will be available at every performance. As well as deaf audiences, there are many other people who can benefit from captions. They are useful for anyone for whom English isn't their first language, for instance, or for people who need support with concentration.

The words spoken by the two performers will be displayed as text, projected onto the back wall of the venue or onto a screen, similar to television subtitles. There will be a pre-show caption projected saying 'If you can read this, it is a good place to sit to see captions clearly' to help you avoid bad sitelines.

Relaxed Performances

We are offering relaxed performances on the following dates:

- Tuesday 30th May at 7.30pm: <u>Theatre by The Lake</u>, Cumbria
- Friday 2nd June at 7.30pm: Live Theatre, Newcastle

You can relax and enjoy the performance in any way that benefits you. This means that if you would like to make a bit of noise, tic, vocal stim or wriggle around throughout the performance, you're very welcome to do so. The show does not contain strobe, flashing flights, and House Lights will be dimmed but not turned off for the duration of the performance. There are 2 sudden loud noises which are noted above, and audience members are free to leave and re-enter the performance at any point. Haze will still be used in relaxed performances.

Depending on the venue, there may be access to a Quiet Space. A Quiet Space is somewhere audiences can retreat to if they feel overwhelmed by the sensory input from the production or surrounding environment. There will be members of our team and venue staff on hand to assist audience members,
